SHOW REPORT. Changes have all been made for the Schedules, and all the Sections have been updated on the Webpage. Still finalising some ads and Partner details for the Schedule, it will be ready to be printed next month. Looking forward to implementing all the exciting changes for this years show. Don't forget our next Show meeting on the 12th February, when we will really start putting all the details together! Looking forward to hearing what the different Sections are planning for their "interactive areas". Either in the Section if sufficient space, or a designated area with a variety of interactive activities for children/young people. "Show Experience Area".

OFFICE BUSINESS:- All of the Sections are now loaded and updated with Showday Online, I hope you have checked out Showday On Line by entering www.showdayonline.com for their web site, and if you are an Exhibitor, please register so you are ready for the show season! The Cooking & Textile Sections will be trailing Show Day this year. This does not mean that entries can **only** be received on line, we will be accepting all entries as usual, but then entering them into the program, and following the process for producing judging sheets, results, prize cards & prize money. If any other section is interested at this stage, just let me know. I will have a workshop some time in March, when we will do a "trial run".

WORK TO BE DONE:- We should have development approval from Council by the end of the month for the new "Ross McDougall" shed, so Boonah Sheds have been notified to be "shovel ready" to get this done ASAP. This has been an expensive, long drawn out and unnecessary process, but is now done & dusted!. The Dining Hall will be getting a facelift, with new doors & windows, floor coverings, painting & curtains, which will be a major improvement, the Office and Meeting room is having changes made, new benches have been done in the Fruit & Veg Section, the Prime Cattle Section will be building a new holding yard, 2 new grandstands are being made at Palen Creek, the Horticulture Section are making changes to their area, a new colourbond fence is being erected between the Caravan Park & Caretakers home, and a concrete slab for the bin area around the Dump point at the Caravan Park have all been approved, so it is going to be rather busy at the grounds in the next few months.

I am enclosing my report from the Think Tank which John & I attended on Tuesday. Hope you find it informative.

In closing, I must thank John Brent & Kay Stegeman for organising my nomination for the "Outstanding Contribution Award" for Queensland Shows, which will be announced at a Gala Dinner at Toowoomba on Saturday, the 19th January. I also thank John, Jim & Margaret, Anthony & Marissa & Ross & Jo who are attending the dinner to support me on the night. I feel very honoured to have been nominated.

- Noted the similarities and the differences between shows & agriculture. Importance of Shows in teaching people about where their food comes from.
- The importance of Agriculture and the role Shows play in educating people or all ages.
- Next Gen NSW have a member to attend every show throughout the state to help the show society
- Show ribbon personal ribbon for outstanding contribution. NSW will share!
- Exchange program, between High Schools Ag Classes at show time. Eg, Mudgeeraba send students to Dalby Show & Dalby send Students to Mudgeeraba Show!.

- Opportunity to see and understand how Different shows work
- Learn how to work with other people., different personalities, to promote youth in Ag
- Brooke Cuddiffy promotes Public speaking with Ag Students, have them judge 4 Apples!
- Shows are about Education.
- Bridging the gap between Town & Country
- Networking is the key. Use it.
- Qld Miss Showgirl have new rules & forms, now on line. Ella O'Hara is now the State Co-ordinator for Miss Showgirl Competition.
- Strong link between High School Ag Departments and their local Show. (3 of the above speakers were Agricultural Science Teachers, and were all heavily involved with their local shows.)
- Communicate with your Schools, let them know as early as possible (6 months notice) of any changes to your programs.

I Came away from this session convinced that our Show Ed & Junior Show Committee is so important, we must never let it falter, must keep it relevant, it is what makes our Show stand out from other shows.

I see the future for our show is bigger & better, we must take every opportunity to promote our show and make it exciting & fun.

Couch Session, - Points of Difference, as seen from a small Show point of view.

- Needs to recognise the people of our Community who built the show. Recognise our History
- Maleny have a Volunteers Dinner on Sunday, 40 people turn up to clean the grounds & buildings, everything is finished by Sunday afternoon and they all enjoy a lunch together!
- Allora High School have a Community Service Award, Students receive recognition for working with the community. Show Gets a lot of support, must be in 2 hour blocks.
- Alstonville stressed the importance of a Business Plan, He took over a very fractured, troubled Show Society, establishing a Business Plan brought them together, now running a very successful show and Showgrounds.
- Associate Judges. Needs promoting, every show should have at least 5 Associate Judges each year. , they can be some of our own exhibitors who might like the opportunity to learn how to be a Judge!
- Allora run a Junior Bull Spectacular, Bulls are judged, then the members of the public are invited to Judge. Entry fee \$2-00. Creates a lot of interest and great feed back.
- Use entertainers to help in areas of the Show, eg, Crack-up Sisters entertained at Oakey's Official opening. Put the fun back into your Show.
- Don't take ourselves too seriously
- FACEBOOK PROMOTION, constantly being repeated, cheap, no cost, in your face advertising.
- Use a caption for advertising, eg, Pittsworth use "Come to our Show, say Gooday", "Gooday" is repeated constantly throughout their promotion & show.

- Use Mentors, not necessary to always focus on the youth, older community members also have a lot to offer. Use them.
- Shows can be Mentors for all ages.
- Really no difference between a small show or a large one, it's like making a cake, you need the same ingredients, just not as much!

Maximising Security & Counter Terrorism at our Shows.

- The following is all on the Webpage, <u>www.nationalsecurity.com.au</u>. Counter Terrorism Guidelines , Self Assessment Tool, Security Audit.

The following should be included in our Risk Management Plan

- Procedure:- ESCAPE HIDE TELL
- Use of CCTV Cameras
- Look for suspicious behaviour
- Approach the person and ask if they need help, they may look lost! This can be a deterrent
- Unauthorised, suspicious looking people taking photographs, especially of children
- Be aware of bags or parcels left unattended, ask if they belong to anyone.
- If they don't have an owner, call police.
- Deterrent Communication, use of barriers
- Animal Rights/Ardini Protestors, be aware of people taking photos, gathering in small groups.
- They are looking for a Social Media presence.
- Shows can be a good protest environment

I was glad that John was able to attend for the morning session. I always come home feeling enthused, and also feeling pretty good about our Show, our Committee & our results. However, there is always more to learn, and I hope, by reading these notes, everyone else may pick up on some new ideas.

I think the attendance was down this year, there were a lot of empty seats, and consequently, not as many opportunities to network. However, there was good representation from shows in NSW, 2 ladies from Katherine show, and all over Queensland, and I think also South Australia was represented. The drought throughout NSW & Western Queensland is having a huge effect on Communities, some shows in NSW are just not happening, which is really sad.

The entertainment area was well represented, but a lot of them were people we already use, Crack-up Sisters, Clive Featherby, KC fireworks, Emu Van, Memphis Movers. Did not find anything new & exciting!
